Professor Serge Sur Director General of the Thucydides Center of International Relations University of Paris II France

Serge Sur was born in 1944. Doctor of Laws from the University of Caen (1970), he is an <u>Associate</u> of the Faculties of Law (<u>Public Law</u>, 1976).

He was stationed at the universities of Algiers (1970-72), of <u>Caen</u> (1972-1977), of <u>Rennes I</u> (1977-1981), of <u>Paris X - Nanterre</u> (1981-1989). Since 1989 he is professor at the <u>University</u> <u>Panthéon-Assas</u>.

He served between 1986 and 1996 as Deputy Director of <u>UNIDIR</u> (United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research) in Geneva. In this capacity, he designed and conducted various research projects on arms control and strategic issues in a multilateral international framework. He is currently a Judge ad hoc of the <u>International Court of Justice</u> in The Hague.

He is responsible for the Master (1 & 2) *International Relations* and Director *of Thucydides* - *Analysis and Research in International Relations* (since 1999) at the <u>University Panthéon-Assas</u>. He founded and directs the *French Yearbook of International Relations* (since 2000), which won the 2008 Foundation Award Bonnefous of the <u>Academy of Moral and Political Sciences</u>. He is also editor of the bimonthly magazine <u>International Issues</u> (French Documentation, since 2003).

He accomplished many missions of teaching or research abroad, in Europe, Africa, North America and Asia. Under the Centre Thucydides, he organized and regularly organizes international conferences in France and abroad on international issues, including international security and European integration.

He assured successively at the <u>Academy of International Law in The Hague</u> as director of French Language Studies (1984), in charge of a course in the session of International Law (1998), and Centre Manager Research Academy in French (2006). It is responsible for teaching General Course of Public International Law at the Academy for 2012.
